# Special Convention California Labor Council on Political Education

### October 19, 1972 Woodlake Inn Sacramento

#### Call to Order

President Albin J. Gruhn called the convention to order at 10:27 a.m. with the following statement:

"Delegates, I do declare this 1972 Special Convention of the California Labor Council on Political Education in order to transact such business as may legally come before it."

He then led the delegates in the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

### Introduction of Father Keith B. Kenny

President Gruhn proceeded to introduce Father Keith B. Kenny to the convention: "At this time it is a privilege for me to present to you, for the purpose of the invocation, Father Keith B. Kenny of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church in Sacramento.

"Before asking Father Kenny to give the invocation, I might state that he has been a great champion and a warrior in the area of assisting the agricultural workers in their organizing campaign. He is a tremendously true and deep friend of the trade union movement."

#### Invocation

# Father Keith B. Kenny Our Lady of Guadalupe Church Sacramento

Father Kenny presented the following invocation:

"Let us pray.

"God our Father, we are here to discuss and decide matters of grave importance to the labor movement in this state and in the nation. Give us the wisdom we so need so that we are aware of the greatness of decisions and actions of the past of which we are the inheritors, yet cognizant of the realities of the present, knowing that what we do here today is not only of today but the fruit of all our yesterdays and the promise of our tomorrow. Give us wisdom to know what is right, what is best for working people and give us the courage then to do what we know to be right. Let not dissension erode that unity of purpose which makes us brothers and which gives us a power for good.

"Finally, we ask that You as Father and we as brothers unite in an effort of justice, of compassion and of love to protect and to help those working folk most threatened and most vulnerable at this moment of history, those who work in the fields, that we may all eat. Give them too this day their daily bread and lead them not into evil. Amen."

#### Welcome to Delegates and Visitors

#### Albin J. Gruhn

President Gruhn then addressed the convention in these words:

"Delegates, I wish to take this opportunity to welcome you and the visitors to the 1972 Special Convention of the California Labor Council on Political Education.

"We are gathered here today to act on a special order of business as outlined in the Special Convention Call sent out to you by our Secretary-Treasurer, Jack Henning.

"As we enter into the deliberations on this important matter, let us keep in mind the need to maintain a unity of purpose and action so that the California Labor Council on Political Education may proceed with maximum strength in carrying out the tremendous task we have before us in the remaining 18 days before the November 7th election.

"At this stage of the election campaign we can ill afford quarreling or looking for scapegoats.

"Let us always remember that the only thing that will really count for labor's friends on election day is votes. Therefore, when we return home after this Special Convention let us pursue with renewed vigor the positive program of educating our members and their families on the issues and getting out the vote on election day. This is our only and best assurance to carry out organized labor's objective of electing our friends and defeating our enemies on November 7th. Victory can and will be ours on November 7th.

On motion of Secretary-Treasurer Henning, duly seconded and carried, the committee appointments were approved.

## Partial Report of Committee on Credentials

#### Loretta Riley, Chairwoman

President Gruhn next called on Chairwoman Loretta Riley of the Committee

on Credentials for her report.

Chairwoman Riley then read the additions to and deletions from the Preliminary Roll of Delegates. (See completed Roll of Delegates.)

She then moved adoption of the committee's report and the seating of the delegates in accordance with the California Labor COPE Constitution.

The motion, duly seconded, was carried.

#### Report of Committee on Rules and **Order of Business**

#### Steve Edney, Chairman

President Gruhn next called upon Steve Edney, chairman of the Committee on Rules and Order of Business for a report.

- 1. Roberts Rules of Order. The convention shall be governed by Roberts Rules of Order on all matters not provided by the Constitution or specified in these rules.
- 2. Rules-Adoption of Standing Rules. The adoption of the standing rules shall require an affirmative vote of the majority of the duly qualified delegates to the convention, present and voting. When once adopted, such standing rules shall remain in effect and shall not be suspended or amended.
- 3. Convening the Convention. The convention shall convene at 10:00 a.m.
- 4. Committee Reports. All committees shall report on all resolutions submitted to them. Whenever there is a majority and minority division on any committee, both the majority and minority shall be entitled to report to the convention. The discussion and vote of concurrence or nonconcurrence shall be first on the minority report.
- 5. Committee Quorum. A majority of any committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of its business. At least a majority of all members present and voting shall be required to adopt a recommendation on a resolution.
- 6. Passage of Motions, Resolutions and Committee Reports by the Convention. (a) No motion or resolution shall be acted upon other than one to adopt committee reports or a report of the Executive Council to rescind the statement adopted at California Labor COPE's Convention on September 8, 1972.
- (b) A majority of the delegates present and voting shall be required to act on a motion, committee report or a resolution for recognition by the Chairman, even

- (c) No motion or resolution shall be finally acted upon until an opportunity to speak has been given the delegate making or introducing same, if he so desires.
- 7. Roll Call Vote. At the request of seventy-five (75) delegates present and voting, any motion shall be voted on by roll call per capita vote of the delegates. When a roll call has been ordered no adjournment shall take place until the result has been announced.
- 8. Precedence of Motions During Debate. When a question is under debate or before the convention, no motion shall be received but the following, which shall take precedence in the order named:

First—To adjourn.

Second-For the previous question provided that the motion has been subject to debate for at least ninety (90) minutes.

Third—To lay on the table.

- 9. Motions in Writing. Upon request of the Chairman, a motion shall be reduced to writing and shall be read to the convention by the Chairman before the same is acted upon.
- 10. Contents of Motions. No motion. whether oral or written, shall be adopted until the same shall be seconded and distinctly stated to the convention by the Chairman.
- 11. Motion to Reconsider. A motion to reconsider shall not be entertained unless. made by a delegate who voted with the prevailing side; such motion shall require a two-thirds vote to carry.
- 12. Motion to Table. A motion to lav on the table shall be put without debate, provided the subject matter has been subject to debate for at least ninety (90) minutes.
- 13. Recognition and Decorum of Delegates. (a) Delegates when arising to speak shall respectfully address the Chair and announce their full name and the identity of the organization which they represent.
- (b) In the event two or more delegates arise to speak at the same time, the Chair shall decide which delegate is entitled to the floor.
- (c) No delegate shall interrupt any other delegate who is speaking, except for the purpose of raising a point of order or appealing from a ruling of the Chair.
- (d) Any delegate may appeal from a decision of the Chairman without waiting

though another delegate has the floor. No appeal is in order when another is pending or when other business has been transacted by the convention prior to the appeal being taken.

- (e) Any delegate who is called to order while speaking shall, at the request of the Chair, be seated while the point of order is decided, after which, if in order, the delegate shall be permitted to proceed. The same shall apply while an appeal from the Chair is being decided.
- (f) No delegate shall speak more than once on the same subject until all who desire to speak shall have had an opportunity to do so; nor more than twice on the same subject without permission by a majority vote of the delegates present and voting; nor longer than five minutes at a time without permission by a majority vote of the delegates present and voting.
- (g) Any delegate may rise to explain a matter personal to himself and shall forthwith be recognized by the Chairman, but shall not discuss a question in such explanation. Such matters of personal privilege yield only to a motion to recess or adjournment.
- 14. Voting Not to be Interrupted. When once begun, voting shall not be interrupted. No delegate shall be allowed to change his vote or have his vote recorded after the vote is announced.
- 15. Attendance of Delegates. Each delegate shall report to the Sergeant-at-Arms at the beginning of the session and shall sign the card presented to him; except, if unavoidably absent, he shall have the privilege of reporting to the Secretary.

Chairman Edney then read the names of the committee's members and moved the adoption of the rules and order of business as unanimously recommended by the committee. The motion was seconded.

Delegate Kenneth Croswell (Communications Wkrs. No. 9490, Oakland) rose to ask if a majority vote would carry a motion to rescind.

Chairman Gruhn indicated that under Roberts Rules of Order, if notice of the proposed action was given with the notice of the meeting, a motion to rescind would be carried by a majority vote.

Delegate Croswell then moved to amend

the committee's report on the rules and order of business so that a motion to rescind would require a two-thirds vote.

His motion was seconded.

Delegates Art Carter (Contra Costa County COPE, Richmond) and W. D. Demers (Communications Wkrs., Southern Calif. Council, Los Angeles) spoke in support of Delegate Croswell's motion.

The vote on the motion to amend the rules and order of business was declared lost by the Chair.

#### Division of the House

Delegate Demers called for a division of the house. A count of those voting was taken by the Sergeants-at-Arms. Based upon the result of the division of the house, Chairman Gruhn declared Delegate Croswell's motion to amend the rules and order of business had carried.

Delegate Ed Turner (Marine Cooks & Stewards, San Francisco) then requested a roll call vote on the motion to amend the rules and order of business. However, the seventy-five delegates required for a roll call were not evident.

The motion to adopt the committee's report, as amended, was then carried.

Chairman Gruhn then discharged the Committee on Rules and Order of Business with his thanks for their efforts.

### Final Report of Committee on Credentials

#### Loretta Riley, Chairwoman

Chairman Gruhn next called upon Loretta Riley, chairwoman of the Committee on Credentials, for her report. She then read the additions to and deletions from the roll of delegates. (See completed Roll of Delegates.)

Chairwoman Riley then moved adoption of the committee's report and that the delegates be seated.

The motion was seconded and carried.

Chairwoman Riley then thanked the committee members for their work and read their names

Chairman Gruhn also thanked the members of the Committee on Credentials.

### Report of the Executive Council

John F. Henning Executive Secretary-Treasurer

Chairman Gruhn next called on Secretary-Treasurer Henning for the Report of the Executive Council.

Secretary-Treasurer Henning then read the report, adopted by the Executive Council on October 18, 1972 in Sacramento, as follows:

California Labor COPE meeting in convention on September 8, 1972, voted overwhelmingly for the defeat of President Nixon.

The vote was inspired by the consistently anti-labor and anti-liberal

record of Richard Nixon.

The vote was also inspired by the realization that if Richard Nixon wins California by a landslide majority, there will be conservative control of both houses of the state legislature and a conservative majority in our

Congressional delegation.

California Labor COPE chose not to endorse a candidate for President on September 8 because of a directive from AFL-CIO President George Meany prohibiting such action. President Meany in two communications, dated July 21 and August 7, advised that the July 19 AFL-CIO Executive Council action of no Presidential endorsement meant that local and state central bodies could not endorse.

California Labor COPE on September 8 declared itself with regard to the candidacy of Richard Nixon. President Meany in a communication dated September 25 informed the California Labor Federation, AFL-CIO, that California Labor COPE must rescind its September 8 action calling for the defeat of Richard Nixon because in his judgment such action was equivalent to an endorsement of Senator George McGovern.

The special convention of October 19 has been called to consider the

directive to rescind issued by President Meany.

California Labor COPE, mindful of the requirements of labor unity, rescinds its action of September 8 as directed by President Meany.

The action to rescind is not a contradiction of the September 8 indict-

ment of the anti-labor, anti-liberal administration of Richard Nixon.

California Labor COPE is fully aware of the disastrous implications of a Nixon victory and therefore requests the AFL-CIO Executive Council to meet as soon as feasible to reconsider its no endorsement position and take all appropriate steps to assure the defeat of Richard Nixon.

Secretary-Treasurer Henning then moved adoption of the Executive Council's report.

The motion was seconded.

Chairman Gruhn then advised the delegates that ninety minutes had transpired and that a motion to close debate was in order.

Delegate J. L. Childers (Bldg. & Const. Trades Council, Oakland) then moved the previous question, which was seconded and carried.

In his closing remarks, Secretary-Treasurer Henning then spoke in support of the motion to adopt the Executive Council's report.

During the debate, Delegate Robert F. Callahan (Fire Fighters No. 798, San Francisco) had moved the previous question.

Chairman Gruhn, however, observed that the adopted Rules and Order of Business, "... state that no motion to close debate can be received until ninety minutes have passed ..."

#### **Roll Call Vote**

Following the lengthy debate on the motion to adopt the Executive Council's report, Chairman Gruhn declared a roll call vote was in order since the required seventy-five delegates had requested it.

Delegate W. D. Demers (Communications Wkrs., Southern California Council, Los Angeles) rose on a point of order stating that he desired a count of the delegates to be certain there were seventy-five delegates present who desired a roll call vote.

Chairman Gruhn replied that there were more than the necessary seventy-five delegates present who expressed a desire for a roll call vote on the motion.

#### **Teller Board Appointed**

Chairman Gruhn then proceeded to appoint the following delegates to the Teller Board to conduct the voting and its tabulation:

Delegate Claude L. Fernandez (Retail Store Empls. No. 428, San Jose) rose to ask if it would be proper for delegates of a local union to transfer its votes to a sister local union of the Retail Store Employees.

Chairman Gruhn, in response, cited Article XII (b), Section 5 of the California COPE Constitution:

"No proxy shall be allowed, but on a roll call or per capita vote one delegate upon prior written approval of all co-delegates may vote for the entire delegation."

After Chairman Gruhn explained the voting procedure to be followed, Loretta Riley, chairwoman of the Teller Board, conducted the roll call vote.

#### Results of Roll Call Vote

When all delegates wishing to vote had done so, Chairman Gruhn declared the voting completed and requested the Teller Board to tabulate the votes.

Loretta Riley, chairwoman of the Teller Board then announced the results as follows: 153,404 "Yes" and 70,456 "No".

Chairman Gruhn declared that the motion to adopt the Executive Council's report had therefore carried by the necessary two-thirds majority.

#### Adjournment

Chairman Gruhn then called on Secretary-Treasurer Henning who moved that the convention be adjourned.

The motion was seconded and carried and Chairman Gruhn declared the convention adjourned sine die at 4:38 p.m.
