**T**HE CONSERVATIVE HYSTERIA THAT intimidated Congress during 1981-1982 failed again last year to influence the course of legislation in California.

*Labor came out of the 1982 session with the greatest workers' compensation benefit increase in the history of the state law. The victory was attained against the massed opposition of both corporate and local government entities.*

*Another historic advance was realized when the state's maximum unemployment insurance benefit was increased by \$30 a week, the highest boost on record.*

*The workers' compensation victory will mean \$652 million in benefit increases over a two year period while the unemployment insurance increase will mean \$100 million more in weekly benefits during 1983.*

*In all there were 26 measures of AFL-CIO sponsorship or approval enacted during the session. We couldn't have done it alone. It was possible in large because of the liberal commitment and assistance of Governor Edmund G. Brown, Jr. and the leadership provided by Speaker of the Assembly Willie Brown, Jr. and President Pro Tem of the Senate David Roberti and the members who followed their direction.*

*Defensive victories were also recorded against the conservative aggressors who look with contempt on the purposes of Labor and the needs of the low and middle income millions of America.*

*Political conservatives have nothing to offer Labor or the nation. The year 1982 revealed that California Labor-liberalism was still alive and vibrant. It must be more so in the months and years before us.*

**I**N ITS STATE LEGISLATIVE PROGRAMS the California Labor Federation for the second consecutive year ran against the Reaganite conservative trend with uncommon success.

Our state, like the rest of America, is still reeling from the most damaging economic crisis since the Great Depression.

Unemployment continues to mount while redistribution of income to the rich continues. Meanwhile, social services for working people either decline in quality or disappear.

The growth of Reaganite conservatism has meant an enhancement of U.S. corporate political influence unparalleled in this century. However, despite the growth of political reaction, the California AFL-CIO last year won passage of legislation that substantially increased workers' compensation benefits and unemployment insurance benefits, prohibited sexual harassment in the workplace, expanded the use of pension funds for the depressed housing market and backed the authorizing of the agency shop for government employees.

Labor's greatest victory of the session was enactment of the largest workers' compensation benefit increases in California history. Maximum temporary disability weekly payments were raised from \$175 to \$196 in 1983 and will go up to \$224 in 1984. Maximum permanent partial weekly benefits were increased from \$70 to \$130 in 1983 and will go to \$140 in 1984. Death benefits jumped from a maximum of \$75,000 to \$90,000.

Labor also scored other path-breaking advances in workers' compensation with the establishment of a cancer presumption for fire fighters exposed to hazardous chemicals and significant administrative and benefit improvements in the state's asbestos workers' compensation fund.

Disabled workers who have been unemployed for up to 30 months will now be eligible to collect state disability insurance benefits.

Allied with union women activists, labor was able to secure legislation prohibiting sexual harassment in the workplace, conforming the State Equal Pay Act to the stronger provisions of the Federal Equal Pay Act and permitting the State Commission on the Status of Women to present its cases within the legislative arena.

In other areas, legislation assured the state's resumption of infrastructural maintenance by its implementation of an air emissions inspection program which complies with federal law. California's compliance frees up hundreds of millions of dollars in deferred federal aid for roads, bridges and other projects.

Labor worked with the legislative leadership in both houses to achieve passage of a number of bills that address California's severe housing crisis. The increased utilization of pension funds as a source of mortgage capital, new bond issues for moderate income housing and lower interest mortgages for first-time home buyers are some of the highlights of this housing package.

Additional measures enacted during the 1982 session include legislation to create an employee retraining program with U.I. funds; a 26 week extension of U.I. benefits to workers in state approved training programs; increases in civil penalties for independent contractors who do not hold a valid state contractors' license and the prohibition of nuisance suits at San Francisco International Airport.

The Federation also succeeded in defeating a number of anti-worker measures. The most publicized victory in this regard was the defeat of legislation which would have removed the state constitutional ban on private employer use of inmate labor.

Other anti-worker proposals defeated included measures that sought to:

— Drastically reduce the coverage of the state's Industrial Welfare Commission.

— Eliminate the state unitary tax on foreign multinational corporations.

— Limit the ability of farm worker organizations to collect political contributions from its membership.

— Reduce the time period for the filing of unemployment discrimination charges with the Fair Employment Practices Commission.

The 1982 legislative session also had its disappointments. The legislature rejected the comprehensive plant closure protections opposed by a united business community. Attempts to regulate union-busting labor management consultants and to provide bonding protections for low-paid culinary employees were also rejected.

# Bills Passed

## **WORKERS' COMPENSATION, UNEMPLOYMENT AND DISABILITY INSURANCE**

1. **AB 684 (Young)** was the major workers' compensation benefit and reform bill raising maximum weekly permanent partial benefits from \$70 to \$140 by 1984; and temporary and permanent total weekly benefits from \$175 to \$224 by 1984; and death benefits by \$20,000 to a maximum of \$95,000. Procedural and legal reforms were also implemented in the liberal construction and dual capacity doctrines as well as other areas.

2. **AB 3011 (Torres)** creates, for purposes of workers' compensation benefits, a rebuttable cancer presumption for firefighters who were exposed to carcinogens and were afflicted with cancer within five years of employment.

3. **AB 2477 (Agnos)** cleans up various technical problems in the operation of the Asbestos Workers Compensation Fund and expands benefit coverage to dependents in cases of the worker's death.

4. **Unemployment Insurance I.** **AB 2901 (Martinez), AB 3154 (McAlister)** and **AB 3461 (P. Johnston)** represents a comprehensive compromise U.I. package, raising the maximum weekly U.I. benefit from \$136 to \$166 as of January 1983. It creates an Employment Training Fund for jobless workers and also provides for a reduction in employer U.I. tax contributions.

5. **SB 1817 (Keene)** extends the eligibility period for disability insurance to 30 months for unemployed workers.

## **PUBLIC EMPLOYEES**

6. **AB 404 (Tucker)** requires school districts and community college districts to make deductions for the payment of service fees as required by an organizational security arrangement.

7. **AB 492 (Alatorre)** authorizes school district governing boards to employ people in programs to perform services conducted under contract in categorically funded projects which are not required by federal or state law.

8. **AB 1448 (Moore)** requires an advisory vote by all affected Los Angeles county employees on whether the county should withdraw from the Social Security System.

9. **SB 1419 (Dills)** extends the right to negotiate agency shop provisions to state employees.

10. **AB 2467 (Campbell)** requires school districts to transfer organization dues deductions designated by certificated employees.

## **WOMEN'S RIGHTS**

11. **SB 1499 (Rains)** removes the judicial prohibition on the Commission on the Status of Women's lobbying activities.
12. **SB 1835 (Keene)** conforms the state Equal Pay Act to the stronger provisions of the federal Equal Pay Act.
13. **AB 1985 (Johnston)** codifies existing state regulations prohibiting sexual harassment in the workplace into state law.

## **HEALTH AND SAFETY**

14. **AB 837 (Rosenthal)** clarifies labor code sections relating to employee discharges over health and safety issues.
15. **ACR 146 (M. Waters)** resolves that the State of California upgrade its testing and evaluation of toxic building materials.
16. **AJR 107 (Floyd)** specifies that local jurisdictions shall not authorize an expansion of the use of plastic pipe in plumbing systems until a full state environmental impact report is performed.

## **HOUSING**

17. **AB 3593 (Bosco)** requires state public employee pension funds to give some priority to investing in housing construction.
18. **AB 3609 (Katz)** authorizes a multimillion dollar bond issue for the construction of low or moderate income housing.
19. **AB 3701 (Costa)** expands the use of public and private pension funds for first time home buyers' mortgages.
20. **SB 1862 (Keene)** requires state employee pension funds to give first priority to investing \$2 billion in California housing in 1983 and 1984.

## **LABOR STANDARDS ENFORCEMENT**

21. **AB 2680 (McCarthy)** extends the contractors' license law to federal lands, to certain independent worker contractors and also extends unemployment insurance coverage to all persons defined as employees under the contractors' license law.
22. **AB 3369 (Floyd)** increases civil penalties for independent contractors who do not hold a valid state contractors' license.

## **TRADE AND COMMERCE**

23. **AB 2909 (Thurman)** prohibits noise nuisance suits at the San Francisco airport until 1985.
24. **SB 1547 (Ayala)** lowers utility rates to California steel manufacturers, shifting the added costs to other industries only, not consumers.
25. **SB 33 (Presley)** provides for a state air emission inspection program for California motor vehicles.

## **AUTO INSURANCE**

26. **AB 2007 (Rosenthal)** restricts motor vehicle insurance companies from discriminating on the basis of occupation unless actuarial data can show a significant actual historical risk differential attributable to the occupation.

# **Bills Defeated**

## **FARM LABOR**

1. **AB 34 (Lehman)** would have conformed the State Agricultural Labor Relations Act to the weaker National Labor Relations Act.

2. **AB 3412 (Costa)** would have conformed the State Agricultural Labor Relations Act to the weaker National Labor Relations Act.

3. **SB 1390 (Nielsen)** would have affected Agricultural Labor Relations Board's decision on union access to non-striking employees.

4. **SB 1454 (Maddy)** would have required the Agricultural Labor Relations Board, when dismissing a complaint, to determine whether the complaint was issued on reasonable cause, and if not, to pay the prevailing party litigation costs out of the ALRB budget.

5. **SB 1602 (Vuich)** would have amended the ALRB to strike out the intent to "encourage collective bargaining."

6. **SB 1840 (Nielsen)** would have eliminated the "Make Whole" remedy from California's Agricultural Labor Relations Act.

## **PRISON LABOR**

7. **SCA 35 (Ellis)** would have eliminated the state constitutional ban on the private sector use of inmate labor.

8. **AB 2955 (Goggin)** would have set up a program allowing the private sector to use inmate labor. Trailer bill to SCA 35.

## **TAXES**

9. **AB 55 (Hughes)** would have eliminated the state unitary tax on foreign multinational corporations.

10. **SB 1610 (Greene)** would have charged a \$50 daily fee for the use of the State Mediation and Conciliation Service.

## **LABOR STANDARDS ENFORCEMENT**

11. **AB 2669 (Nolan)** would have required that the Department

of Industrial Relations pay contractors for reproducing the required records for public works contracting, hindering the collection of relevant data.

12. **SB 814 (Richardson)** would have eliminated the state prevailing wage protections for public construction projects.

13. **SB 817 (Richardson)** would have wiped out the state Occupational Health and Safety Act.

#### **RACIAL DISCRIMINATION**

14. **SB 516 (M. Garcia)** would have reduced the time periods where workers could file employment discrimination charges with the Fair Employment and Housing Commission.

#### **ORGANIZATIONAL SECURITY**

15. **AB 670 (Filante)**, among other provisions, would have disallowed public employee agency shop dues to be used for lobbying or campaign contribution purposes. It also would have prohibited public employee strikes.

#### **PRODUCT LIABILITY**

16. **SB 228 (Davis)** would have overturned the state Supreme Court's Sindell decision concerning product liability protecting consumers in instances where the liable drug manufacturer cannot be clearly determined.

#### **TRADE AND COMMERCE**

17. **AB 2600 (Farr)** would have prohibited the use of steel jaw traps in California.

18. **SB 4 (Rains)** would have required all beverages to be carried in deposit containers only.

**38. Fur Industry** (AB 2600—Farr) would have prohibited the use of steel jaw traps in California. Passed 5-1, April 14, 1982. (Yes == Wrong)

- 39. Unitary Tax** (AB 55—Hughes) would have eliminated the state unitary tax on multinational corporations. Passed 12-4, January 26, 1982. (Yes = **Wrong**)
- 40. Culinary Bonding** (AB 1822—Floyd) would have required new restaurants with more than seven employees to post a bond of two weeks wages for each employee. Passed 13-8, January 20, 1982. (Yes = **Right**)
- 41. Strikebreakers 3** (AB 1114—Floyd) would have prohibited the use of strikebreakers in California and prohibited private security guards from using tear gas on strikers. Passed 12-10, January 20, 1982. (Yes = **Right**)
- 42. OSHA 3** (AB 726—Altavore) would have required employers to respond in writing within 72 hours to employee requests for information regarding working conditions which are immediately or ultimately dangerous to workers. Passed 16-1, January 20, 1982. (Yes = **Right**)
- 43. Strikebreakers 4** (AB 3140—Berman) would have prohibited the use of strikebreakers in California and banned the use of tear gas by private security guards. Failed 6-7, June 9, 1982. (Yes = **Right**)
- 44. Strikebreakers 5** (AB 3140—Berman) would have prohibited the use of tear gas by private security guards. Passed 12-10, June 16, 1982. (Yes = **Right**)
- 45. Citizens' Utility Board 2** (AB 2931—Levine) would have established a voluntarily financed Citizens' Utility Board to protect consumer interests before the Public Utilities Commission. Passed 15-6, June 7, 1982. (Yes = **Right**)
- 46. Paternity Leave 2** (AB 3370—Agnos) would have required employers to provide all employees with unpaid leave of up to 4 months under specified conditions to care for a newborn child or newly adopted child, if the adopted child's age is less than 6 years. Passed 12-4, June 7, 1982. (Yes = **Right**)

- 47. Plant Closures 3** (AB 3254—Wray) would have required firms to provide displaced workers with 99 days of extended health benefits coverage and under certain conditions, make displaced employees eligible for loans. Failed 10-8, May 26, 1982. (Yes = **Right**)
- 48. Plant Closures 4** (AB 3254—Wray) would have required firms to provide displaced workers with 90 days of extended health benefits coverage and under certain conditions, make displaced workers eligible for loans. Passed 12-8, June 2, 1982. (Yes = **Right**)
- 49. Plastic Pipe 2** (AB 2636—Papan) would have prohibited various state agencies from issuing new regulations permitting the use of plastic pipe for potable water until a final environmental impact report is completed and certified. Passed 13-5, May 26, 1982. (Yes = **Right**)
- 50. Pregnancy Discrimination 2** (AB 2800—M. Waters) would have made it an unlawful employment practice for an employer to refuse to hire or employ an individual because of her pregnancy, childbirth or related medical conditions. Passed 14-5, June 10, 1982. (Yes = **Right**)
- 51. Labor Standards Enforcement 3** (AB 3369—Floyd) increases civil penalties for independent contractors who do not hold a valid state contractors' license. Passed 13-6, May 27, 1982. (Yes = **Right**)
- 52. Labor Standards Enforcement 4** (AB 2680—McCarthy) extends the contractors' license law to federal lands, to certain independent worker contractors and also extends unemployment insurance coverage to all persons defined as employees, under the contractors' license law. Passed 12-6, May 27, 1982. (Yes = **Right**)
- 53. Workers' Compensation 2** (AB 3011—Torres) creates, for purposes of workers' compensation benefits, a rebuttable cancer presumption for firefighters who were exposed to carcinogens and were afflicted with cancer

- within five years of employment. Passed 12-6, May 26, 1982. (Yes == Right)
- 54. Agency Shop 4** (AB 2967—Moore) would have allowed school employees to hold binding agency shop elections at the union's expense in the event of a bargaining impasse. Passed 13-8, May 19, 1982. (Yes == Right)
- 55. School Employees 2** (AB 404—Tucker) requires school districts and community college districts to make deductions for the payment of service fees as required by an organizational security arrangement. Passed 14-4, January 6, 1982. (Yes == Right)
- 56. School Employees 3** (AB 2467—Campbell) requires school districts to transfer organization dues deductions designated by certificated employees. Passed 14-8, May 5, 1982. (Yes == Right)

- 57. Polygraphs 2** (AB 2383—Floyd) would have extended to public employees the same rights to refuse polygraph tests without reprisal that private sector employees have. Passed 15-4. April 28, 1982. (Yes == Right)
- 58. Guestworkers 3** (AB 2309—Alatorre) would have allowed California to utilize federal legislative provisions on immigration to avoid participation in any federal guestworker program. Passed 12-7, April 14, 1982. (Yes == Right)
- 59. Housing 3** (AB 3593—Bosco) requires public employee pension funds to give some priority to investing in housing construction. Passed 14-5, May 26, 1982. (Yes == Right)
