

Working families had a voice in Sacramento in 1999. We made ourselves heard in the State Capitol and in our legislators' district offices. When we spoke out for all California workers, we won key victories.

Sweetest among our victories was the restoration of daily overtime pay. We put back what Pete Wilson took away in 1997—\$1 billion in lost overtime pay for California working families.

Other important bills became law through the combined efforts of the Federation's Building Prosperity program and our affiliates' legislative programs—all made possible by union mobilization at the activist rank and file level. Our new laws will:

- reduce discrimination against older workers
- stiffen employer penalties for OSHA violations
- address underground economy abuses in the garment sweatshop industry
- protect construction workers' pay by using the modal rate in determining the prevailing wage.
- allow workers to use sick days to care for family members
- provide the first disability insurance increase since 1991
- stiffen penalties against employers who illegally discriminate against workers
- establish fair share fees for UC and CSU employees, and
- expand picketline freedom and remove union liability for unsanctioned activity

While the Governor signed many worker-friendly bills, there were disappointments.

He vetoed seven measures supported by the Federation.

Needed improvements in benefits for injured workers were frustrated, but we will pursue them again in 2000. We will also seek advances in unemployment insurance, funding for in-home support services, childcare programs and immigrants' rights, collective bargaining rights for public employees and fairer tax policies.

We must continue to make our voices heard. With a growing field mobilization of dedicated union members and an army of volunteer activists, we can hold elected officials accountable for their promises and actions.

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Federation-Supported Bills Enacted

AGE DISCRIMINATION

1. **SB 26 (Escutia)** Stops employers from replacing older workers with younger, lower paid workers.

AGENCY SHOP

2. **SB 645 (Burton)** Establishes fair share fees for University of California and California State University employees.

APPRENTICESHIP

3. **AB 921 (Keeley)** Changes composition of Apprenticeship Council, revises apprenticeship standards and requires audits of apprenticeship programs.

CAL-OSHA

4. **AB 850 (Torlakson)** Expands OSHA inspection authority to cover permanent amusement rides.

5. **AB 1127 (Steinberg)** Increases penalties against employers who wilfully ignore Cal-OSHA standards, thereby causing death or serious injury to a worker.

6. **AB 1655 (Hertzberg)** Eliminates the sunset date for employer contributions to the Cal-OSHA Targeted Inspection Program.

CIVIL RIGHTS

7. **AB 1670 (Judiciary Committee)** Stiffens penalties against employers who illegally discriminate against workers.

8. **SB 1279 (Polanco)** Ensures that out-of-state University of California employees are covered by collective bargaining agreements.

FACULTY PART-TIMERS

10. **AB 420 (Wildman)** States intent for equal pay for equal

work and benefits for 30,000 part-time California Community College faculty.

FAMILY SICK LEAVE

FARM LABOR VEHICLES

Federation-Supported Bills Vetoed

AGENCY SHOP

1. **AB 240 (Honda)** Would have established agency shop for local government supervisory employees.

BIG BOX RETAIL

2. **AB 84 (Floyd)** Would have prohibited stores which sell a certain percentage of non-taxable goods from expanding, thereby inhibiting the proliferation of Wal-Marts and Costcos.

BUY AMERICA

3. **AB 214 (Wiggins)** Would have required materials on public work projects to be American made.

COLLECTIVE BARGAINING

4. **SB 372 (Murray)** Would have ensured that employees of Los Angeles Metro Transportation Authority (LAMTA) maintain the protections of their collective bargaining agreements.

WAGE AND HOUR ENFORCEMENT

5. **AB 1652 (Steinberg)** Would have strengthened the ability of the Labor Commissioner to crackdown on the underground economy.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

6. **SB 320 (Solis)** Would have helped workers who put their health and their lives on the line for California's economy keep up with our state's high cost of living.

WORKERS' VOICE

7. **AB 442 (Cedillo)** Would have prohibited the misuse of taxpayer funds when corporations use state funds to interfere with workers' freedom to choose.

Federation-Opposed Bill Defeated

DISABILITY PLAN PAYMENTS

1. **AB 605 (Margett)** Would have allowed voluntary disability plans to make annual, rather than quarterly payments, to the Employment Development Department, causing EDD to lose interest earnings.

Federation-Supported Two-Year Bills

CHILDCARE

1. **AB 212 (Aroner)** Improves quality of child care services for working families by providing incentives for trained, experienced workers to stay in the field.

IN-HOME SUPPORT SERVICES
