The California Labor Federation is the state AFL-CIO, with more than 1,300 affiliated local unions, representing 2.1 million union members in diverse communities and sectors of the state's economy. Manufacturing, service, retail, construction, public sector and private industry unions join together in the Federation to protect and advance the rights and interests of all California workers.

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Corporate Money Talks, the Governor Listens

In his first year in office, Governor Schwarzenegger vetoed every major Labor bill that reached his desk.

The Governor received millions of dollars in campaign contributions, the underwriting of lavish receptions and even had corporations pay for his trip to the Republican National Convention in New York City. Governor Schwarzenegger has now raised more corporate special interest money than any other politician in America except George W. Bush.

Labor's 2004 bills were aimed at saving jobs and protecting health care. The session ended with the passage of every major Labor bill, but was followed by the veto of each by Arnold Schwarzenegger.

Lockstep with the Chamber of Commerce, Governor Schwarzenegger vetoed each of the following bills:

Offshoring bills that would have stopped the use of taxpayer dollars to create jobs in other countries (AB 1829 - Liu); required companies to disclose when private medical records are sent offshore and receive the patient's consent prior to offshoring (SB 1492 - Dunn); guaranteed that no work essential to homeland security could be done offshore (SB 888 - Dunn); and required corporations doing business in California to report their number of jobs in the state, in the country, and in other countries (AB 3021 - Assembly Labor Committee).

A bill that would have helped control the skyrocketing costs of prescription drugs by providing better and more transparent information to health care purchasers (AB 1960 - Pavley), and a bill that would have increased the minimum wage from \$6.75 an hour to \$7.75 an hour over two years (AB 2832 - Leiber) were also both vetoed.


His vetoes directly demonstrated his loyalty to business contributors like offshoring giants Hewlett Packard, J.P. Morgan Chase and Deloitte & Touche and pharmaceutical heavy hitters like Allergan, Novartis, Bristol-Myers Squibb and Pfizer.

This year, corporate financial interests were able to buy their way into the Legislative system. While we will never be able to match their deep pockets, we can beat them by organizing our members and continuing to demand reform.

Key Labor Bills

1. **Pesticide Drift Prevention** (SB 391 - Florez). Holds persons using pesticides liable for certain related medical costs for individuals in the surrounding community, and not just for workers. Passed Senate Floor 22-7 on 01/26/04; Passed Assembly Floor 43-34 on 08/27/04. SIGNED.
2. **Work Related to Homeland Security** (SB 888 - Dunn). Would have guaranteed that all work related to Homeland Security be done in the United States. Passed Senate Floor 24-13 on 8/27/04; Passed Assembly Floor 42-35 on 8/25/04. VETOED.
3. **Economic Impact Report** (SB 1056 - Alarcón). Would have required cities and counties to procure an economic impact report prior to approving or disapproving a development project for the construction of a superstore. Passed Senate Floor 22-15 on 08/25/2004; Passed Assembly Floor 43-31 on 08/16/04. VETOED.
4. **Election of STRS Board Members** (SB 1137 - Burton). Would have required the member of the STRS Board who represents retired members of the system to be elected by the retirees rather than appointed by the governor. Passed Senate Floor 21-8 on 4/29/04; Passed Assembly Floor 49-31 on 8/17/04. VETOED.
5. **Offshoring/ Medical Privacy** (SB 1492 - Dunn). In its amended form, would have required health care businesses to receive a patient's consent prior to records being transferred offshore. Passed Assembly Floor 43-35 on 8/25/04; Passed Senate Floor Concurrence 22-13 on 8/27/04. VETOED.
6. **Rest Breaks for Piece Rate Workers** (SB 1538 - Alarcon). Would have guaranteed that workers who earn by piece rate receive rest breaks. Passed Senate Floor 22-14 on 5/19/04; Passed Assembly Floor 40-29 on 8/18/04. VETOED.
7. **State Personnel Board Contracting Out** (SB 1892 - Burton). Would have unified the procedures that the State Personnel Board uses to review personal service contracts and helped ensure that contractors do not unknowingly execute illegal contracts with the state. Passed Senate Floor 21-12 on 5/25/04; Passed Assembly Floor 45-32 on 8/25/04. VETOED.
8. **Grape Tasting** (SB 1901 - Alarcon). Would have prohibited employers from requiring harvesting employees to taste or consume unwashed grapes in the field or prior to testing. Passed Senate Floor 21-12 on 5/19/04; Passed Assembly Floor 44-32 on 8/18/04. VETOED.
9. **Developmentally Disabled Program Funding** (AB 649 - Wiggins). Would have encouraged the state to seek the maximum amount of federal money for community-based services and support for people with developmental disabilities. Passed Assembly Floor 57-9 on 1/26/04; Passed Senate Floor 22-12 on 8/19/04. VETOED.
10. **Unemployment Insurance Employer Fraud** (AB 664 - Lowenthal). Cracks down on employers who evade paying UI taxes. Passed Assembly Floor 48-29 on 8/27/04; Passed Senate Floor 22-14 on 8/27/04. SIGNED.
11. **Heavy-duty Vehicle Air Pollution** (AB 1009 - Pavley). Requires, to the extent permissible under federal law, commercial heavy-duty vehicles entering into the state to meet specified emission standards requirements. Passed Assembly Floor 56-23 on 8/27/04; Passed Senate Floor 27-10 on 8/26/04. SIGNED.
12. **Direct Deposit for Farm Workers** (AB 1723 - Koretz). Would have facilitated direct deposit banking services for some of the poorest workers in California, farm workers. Passed Assembly Floor 41-35 on 8/27/04; Passed Senate Floor 23-14 on 8/25/04. VETOED.

13. **Preventing Offshoring of State Work** (AB 1829 - Liu). Would have prohibited private contractors and subcontractors from using taxpayer funds to create jobs in another country. Passed Assembly Floor 46-32 on 5/27/04; Passed Senate Floor 21-14 on 8/23/04. VETOED.
14. **Prison Education** (AB 1914 - Montanez). Would have strengthened correctional education by establishing goals and objectives to reform prison education. Passed Assembly Floor 43-34 on 5/25/04; Senate Floor 23-7 on 8/19/04. VETOED.
15. **Pharmaceutical Industry Transparency** (AB 1960 - Pavley). Would have created more transparency standards for Pharmacy Benefit Managers when they present information to health care purchasers. Passed Senate Floor 23-15 on 8/24/04; Passed Assembly Floor 50-26 on 5/26/04. VETOED.
16. **Providing Reliable Energy** (AB 2006 - Nunez). Would have ensured that California has an electric utility system capable of providing reliable sources of energy to support a growing economy. Passed Assembly Floor 45-30 on 8/27/04; Passed Senate Floor 22-14 on 8/26/04. VETOED.
17. **Prescription Drug Report Card** (AB 2326 - Corbett). Would have created a "prescription drug report card" for California consumers, physicians and health care purchasers. Passed Assembly Floor 50-25 on 5/26/04; Failed in Senate Committee 5-5 on 8/17/04. DIED.
18. **Prevention of Worksite Lock-ins** (AB 2545 - Koretz). Would have prevented employers from locking-in employees at their place of work. Passed Assembly Floor 47-31 on 5/24/04; Passed Senate Floor 21-13 on 8/11/04. VETOED.
19. **Telemarketer Location Identification** (AB 2715 - Reyes). Would have required telemarketing and customer service call centers to verify the origin of the call when they contact California consumers. Passed Assembly Floor 44-30 on 5/26/04; Passed Senate Floor 21-12 on 8/10/04. VETOED.
20. **Apprenticeship Program Graduation** (AB 2837 - Firebaugh). Would have required a minimum graduation rate for state apprenticeship programs to receive state funding. Passed Assembly Floor 51-24 on 5/26/04; Passed Senate Floor 25-13 on 8/24/04. VETOED.
21. **Job Protection for Building Security Workers** (AB 2850 - Ridley-Thomas). Would have required private security officers to stay on the job for at least 90 days when a new contractor is hired. Passed Assembly Floor 43-33 on 5/17/04; Passed Senate Floor 21-14 on 8/24/04. VETOED.
22. **Restore the Value of the Minimum Wage** (AB 2832 - Lieber). Would have raised the state minimum wage from \$6.75 to \$7.75 over two years, in two 50-cent increments. Passed Assembly Floor 46-30 on 5/26/04; Passed Senate Floor 22-14 on 8/19/04. VETOED.
23. **Wage Payment** (AB 3018 - Koretz). Would have made changes to existing law regarding meal periods and the payment of wages upon discharge in the trucking and entertainment industries. Passed Assembly Floor 73-6 on 8/27/04; Passed Senate Floor 30-2 on 8/26/04. VETOED.
24. **California Jobs Data Collection** (AB 3021 - Assembly Labor Committee). Would have required employers to report annually to the Employment Development Department (EDD) the number of jobs maintained in California, in other states, and outside of the United States. Passed Assembly Floor 47-32 on 5/27/04; Passed Senate Floor 23-14 on 8/25/04. VETOED.
25. **Supporting the Right to Organize** (AJR 87 - Goldberg). This resolution informs Congress that the California Legislature supports efforts to guarantee that workers have the freedom to form a union, free from intimidation and harassment. Passed Assembly Floor 45-28 on 6/7/04; Passed Senate Floor 22-12 on 8/11/04. PASSED WITH NO ACTION BY GOVERNOR REQUIRED.

26. **Rights for Hotel Room Attendants** (AB 606 - Nunez). Would have enacted the "Humane Treatment of Hotel Room Attendants Act of 2004" to require rest periods and improve working conditions. Passed Senate Appropriations Committee 6-4 on 8/12/04; Passed Senate Floor 22-12 on 8/23/04; Passed Assembly Floor 43-32 on 8/27/04. VETOED.
27. **Educational Administrator Reporting** (AB 745 - Goldberg). Would have required a county superintendent of schools, the governing board of a school district, and the governing board of a community college district to annually report all compensation received for certain administrative, certificated, and classified personnel. Passed Assembly Floor 53-22 on 6/02/03; Passed Senate Education Committee 8-1 on 6/23/04; Passed Senate Floor 24-8 on 08/19/04. VETOED.
28. **Binding Arbitration for State Firefighters** (AB 1362 - Wiggins). Would have guaranteed state firefighters the same binding arbitration protection currently available to municipal firefighters and law enforcement officers. Passed Assembly PERS Committee 7-1 on 8/25/04; Passed Senate Floor 23-12 on 08/19/04. Passed Assembly Floor 65-12 on 08/26/04. VETOED.
29. **Outsourcing through the Repeal of SB 1419** (SB 789 - Johnson). Would have repealed SB 1419 and allowed outsourcing of classified jobs, repealed laws restricting the use of short-term employees, and repealed laws providing rights for part-time playground workers in the schools. Defeated in Senate Education Committee 3-7 on 1/14/04. BAD BILL.
30. **School Employee Contracts** (SB 790 - Johnson). Would have allowed school employers to reopen contracts unilaterally and renegotiate if there is a downturn in the economy. Defeated in Senate Education Committee 4-6 on 1/14/04. BAD BILL.
31. **Repeal of Labor Compliance Programs** (SB 1204 - Margett). Would have repealed requirements for Labor Compliance Programs on education-related public works projects. Defeated in Senate Labor Committee 3-5 on 4/14/04. BAD BILL.
32. **Curtailing Labor Protection** (SB 1505 - McClintock). Would have created significant hurdles to implementing legislation that protects workers in the state. Passed Senate Governmental Organization Committee 9-0 on 4/20. Defeated in Senate Judiciary Committee 1-3 on 5/04/04. BAD BILL.
33. **Use of Dues for Political Purposes** (AB 2052 - Haynes). Similar to Proposition 226, this bill would have required an employer to notify each worker of any deductions made from the employee's paycheck that are to be used for political purposes. Defeated in Assembly Labor and Employment Committee 2-6 on 4/21/04. BAD BILL.
34. **School and Community College District Contracting Out** (AB 2415 - Garcia). Would have repealed various sections of law dealing with contracting out services performed by classified school employees (SB 1419 (Alarcón) 2002). Defeated in Assembly PERS Committee 3-6 on 5/5/04. BAD BILL.
35. **Classified School Employee Contracting Out** (AB 2992 - McCarthy). Would have repealed various sections of law dealing with contracting out services performed by classified school employees (SB 1419 (Alarcón) 2002). Defeated in Assembly PERS Committee 3-6 on 5/5/04. BAD BILL.
36. **Contracting Out Constitutional Amendment** (SCA 15 - McClintock). Would have placed a constitutional amendment on the ballot authorizing the Governor to contract out for any state service. Died in Senate Governmental Organization Committee. Defeated in Senate Governmental Organization Committee on 4-7 on 4/20/04. BAD BILL.
