**A REVIEW OF THE LEGISLATIVE YEAR
BY THE CALIFORNIA AFL - CIO**

California Labor Federation, AFL-CIO

The California Labor Federation is the state AFL-CIO, with more than 1,200 affiliated local unions, representing 2.1 million union members in diverse communities and sectors of the state's economy. Manufacturing, service, retail, construction, public sector and private industry unions join together in the Federation to protect and advance the rights and interests of all California workers.

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Attacks From All Sides and Finally, Victory

In 2005, the legislative session was overshadowed by Governor Schwarzenegger's call for a Special Election. The Governor's Special Election had a dual agenda - to eliminate gains for working families by circumventing the Legislature, and to silence union opposition to future takeaways. Schwarzenegger's key measure aimed to silence the political voice of union members. His other initiatives tried to weaken rights for schoolteachers, to enact a budget power grab and conservative redistricting scheme, and to pass phony prescription drug reform.

The Governor vetoed most of the pro-worker bills that crossed his desk. He rejected legislation to increase the minimum wage and index it to the cost of living (AB 48 - Leiber), to track the offshoring of California jobs (AB 524 - Chan), to crack down on employers who cheat workers out of wages or cheat on their taxes (AB 875 - Koretz), and to require the disclosure of employers, like Wal-Mart, who rely on state programs to provide health care for their workers (AB 89 - J. Horton).

Schwarzenegger continued to reward his corporate contributors by pursuing regulatory changes to weaken the right to a lunch break and to overturn hospital staffing regulations. His appointee to head the workers' compensation system created a new permanent disability system that ignored the law and slashed benefits to injured workers by 50%.


By the end of 2005, however, the smoke had cleared and the political landscape was changed. An energized union movement served Schwarzenegger a crushing defeat on each of his ballot initiatives. He retreated from his attempt to overturn staffing ratios in hospitals. And at the start of the new year, he was forced to withdraw his lunch break takeaway.

The year brought few legislative wins but nonetheless saw important victories for working people. We will strive to build upon these victories in 2006 and beyond.

Governor Schwarzenegger's Record on Labor's Bills in 2005

Key Labor Bills

1. **Minimum Wage Increase** (AB 48 - Lieber). Would have raised the minimum wage from \$6.75 to \$7.75 over two years and then indexed it to the cost of living. Passed Assembly Floor 49-30 on 06/02/05; Passed Senate Floor 26-14 on 09/07/05. VETOED.
2. **Apprenticeship Program Standard** (AB 51 - Koretz). Would have ensured that construction apprenticeship programs must graduate at least one apprentice to be reimbursed by the state. Passed Assembly Floor 48-26 on 05/26/05; Passed Senate Floor 25-15 on 09/07/05. VETOED.
3. **Prescription Drugs Website** (AB 71 - Chan). Would have created a website on the safety and effectiveness of prescription drugs. Passed Assembly Floor 44-34 on 06/02/05. HELD in Senate Health Committee.
4. **Pharmacy Benefits Managers Transparency** (AB 78 - Pavley). Would have created transparency standards for drug industry middlemen known as "Pharmacy Benefit Managers." Passed Assembly Floor 44-34 on 06/01/05; Passed Senate Floor 23-14 on 09/06/05. VETOED.
5. **Corporate Subsidies for Healthcare** (AB 89 - Horton). Would have required disclosure and annual reporting of employers whose workers are enrolled in taxpayer-funded healthcare. Passed Assembly Floor 46-33 on 05/31/05; Passed Senate Floor 21-15 on 08/31/05. VETOED.
6. **Public Employee Pension Protection** (AB 310 - Umberg). Would have provided protections and safeguards to public employees enrolled in defined contribution investment plans. Passed Assembly Floor 44-33 on 05/26/05; Passed Senate Floor 23-14 on 09/30/05. VETOED.
7. **Unemployment Benefits for Locked-out Workers** (AB 391 - Koretz). Would have made unemployment insurance benefits available to workers locked out of their place of employment by their employer. Passed Assembly Floor 45-33 on 06/01/05; Passed Senate Floor 22-13 on 09/31/05. VETOED.
8. **Labor Compliance Programs** (AB 414 - Klehs). Strengthens the laws on the use of public education funds for construction projects and the inclusion of labor compliance programs by prohibiting the use of construction managers as third party contractors. Passed Assembly Floor 43-28 on 05/05/05; Passed Senate Floor 24-15 on 09/06/05. SIGNED.
9. **Offshore State Contracting** (AB 524 - Chan). Would have mandated the Department of General Services to require successful bidders for state contracts to complete a standard questionnaire detailing any and all portions of a contract that will be performed by subcontractors or employees outside the United States. Passed Assembly Floor 47-32 on 06/01/05; Passed Senate Floor 24-15 on 09/06/05. VETOED.
10. **Corporate Tax Liability** (AB 675 - Klehs). Would call for the Franchise Tax Board to conduct a study to evaluate the impact of calculating corporate tax liability in California using book income rather than tax income. Passed Assembly Floor 48-31 on 05/31/05. HELD in Senate Revenue and Taxation Committee.
11. **Piece Rate Worker Rights** (AB 755 - De La Torre). Would have strengthened the right of piece rate workers to take rest breaks and recover lost wages when they are deprived of a paid rest period. Passed Assembly Floor 42-35 on 05/23/05; Passed Senate Floor 21-16 on 09/22/05. VETOED.
12. **Hospital Staffing Evaluation** (AB 761 - Jones). Would have required the Department of Health Services to evaluate adequacy of hospital staffing by reviewing professional association guidelines as well as worker and patient injury rates. Passed Assembly Floor 43-35 on 06/02/05; FAILED Senate Floor 18-20 on 09/08/05.
13. **Heat Illness Standards** (AB 805 - Chu). Would require the Cal-OSHA Standards Board to adopt standards for heat illness prevention by December 1, 2006. Passed Assembly Floor 43-34 on 06/02/05. HELD in Senate Appropriations Committee.

14. **Health & Safety Standards** (AB 815 - Lieber). Would require the California Division of Occupational Safety and Health (Cal/OSHA) Standards Board to adopt revised or new workplace standards prepared by the Hazard Evaluation System and Information Service (HESIS) within the Department of Health Services. Passed Assembly Floor 44-34 on 06/01/05. HELD in Senate Appropriations Committee.
15. **Labor and Tax Law Enforcement** (AB 875 - Koretz). Would have improved labor law enforcement efforts in the underground economy, leveled the playing field for responsible businesses, and generated additional tax revenue for the state of California. Passed Assembly Floor 45-32 on 05/16/05; Passed Senate Floor 21-12 on 09/01/05. VETOED.
16. **Labor Violation Accountability** (AB 879 - Torrico). Would have held unscrupulous employers accountable when they ignore claims filed by their employees with the Labor Commissioner. Passed Assembly Floor 46-31 on 05/26/2005. Passed Senate Floor 23-15 on 09/06/05. VETOED.
17. **Beef Labeling Requirement** (AB 1058 - Koretz). Would have required restaurants, retailers and other businesses to notify the public of the country of origin of any imported beef or food product containing imported beef that is offered for sale. Passed Assembly Floor 41-36 on 06/02/05; Passed Senate Floor 21-15 on 09/25/05. VETOED.
18. **Horse Racing Jockey Protections** (AB 1180 - Torrico). Enacts reforms of the health, safety, and economic conditions of jockeys in the horse racing industry. Passed Assembly Floor 64-12 on 06/02/05; Passed Senate Floor 35-5 on 09/23/05. SIGNED.
19. **Healthcare Worker Mandatory Overtime** (AB 1184 - Koretz). Would have protected patient safety and worker health by prohibiting mandatory overtime for state healthcare professionals, except in emergencies. Passed Assembly Floor 45-33 on 05/31/05; Passed Senate Floor 22-14 on 09/01/05. VETOED.
20. **Severance Offer Disclosure** (AB 1310 - Nuñez). Would have required large employers to disclose the true cost of a voluntary resignation to the affected employee and provide a 21-day period during which the employee may reconsider his decision. Passed Assembly Floor 42-34 on 06/01/05; Passed Senate Floor 21-15 on 09/06/05. VETOED.
21. **Labor Complaint Processing** (AB 1311 - Assembly Committee on Labor and Employment). Simplifies the way the Labor Commissioner can serve employers with a complaint for violation of a labor law. Passed Assembly Floor 45-32 on 05/16/2005. Passed Senate Floor 27-12 on 09/06/05. SIGNED.
22. **Lunch Break Regulations** (ACR 43 - J. Horton). Declared that the Division of Labor Standards Enforcement (DLSE) lacks the authority to promulgate regulations to take away a right to a lunch break. Passed Assembly Floor 44-31 on 04/14/05; Passed Senate Floor 23-14 on 07/11/05. ENACTED with no action required by the Governor.
23. **Rejecting Privatization of Social Security** (AJR 13 - Torrico). Advises Congress that Californians reject the Bush Administration's plan to privatize Social Security and shift investment risks from the government to individuals. Passed Assembly Floor 42-30 on 04/21/05; Passed Senate Floor 23-14 on 07/11/05. ENACTED with no action required by the Governor.
24. **Pension Protection** (HR 18 - Mullin). Calls on Congress to pass federal legislation to protect the pensions of airline employees and retirees who have worked hard to earn a decent retirement. Passed Assembly Floor 44-24 on 09/18/05. ENACTED with no action required by the Governor.
25. **Stabilization of Workers' Compensation Costs** (SB 46 - Alarcón). Would have stabilized the costs of workers' compensation insurance by guaranteeing that rates cannot be excessive, inadequate, or unfairly discriminatory. Passed Senate Floor 23-14 on 05/31/05. FAILED in Assembly Insurance Committee.
26. **Pharmaceutical Company Marketing Disclosure** (SB 163 - Scott). Would have required a pharmaceutical company entering into a contract with the State to disclose the percentage of its operating budget that is spent on marketing. Passed Senate Floor 22-15 on 05/31/05. FAILED in Assembly Business and Professions Committee.
27. **Workers' Compensation Cost Control** (SB 292 - Speier). Would have saved workers' compensation costs by regulating reimbursement rates for prescription drugs dispensed by doctors. Passed Senate Floor 40-0 on 05/26/05. HELD in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

28. **School District Public Contracts** (SB 327 - Lowenthal). Would have clarified that school districts cannot enter into contracts, leases or issue purchase orders without advertising for contract bids ("piggyback contracting") for the construction of school facilities. Passed Senate Floor 21-14 on 05/16/05; Passed Assembly Floor 48-31 on 09/31/05. VETOED.
29. **Hospital Lift Teams** (SB 363 - Perata). Would have required specified hospitals to implement a policy of replacing manual lifting of patients with powered patient transfer devices, lifting devices, or lift teams ("zero lift policy"). Health care workers lead the nation in back injury rates. Passed Senate Floor 25-14 on 06/01/05; Passed Assembly Floor 47-32 on 09/31/05. VETOED.
30. **Pharmaceutical Marketing Prohibition** (SB 401 - Ortiz). Would prohibit drug companies from including advertisements in the written materials a patient receives with a prescription. Passed Senate Floor 23-13 on 05/26/05. HELD in Assembly Health Committee.
31. **Public Works Payroll Records** (SB 759 - Maldonado). Allows for the use of electronic and non-electronic certified payroll records in the public works construction industry. Passed Senate Floor 38-0 on 05/09/05; Passed Assembly Floor 77-1 on 09/30/05. SIGNED.
32. **Port Truck Driver Organizing** (SB 848 - Dunn). Would have permitted port truck drivers to organize. Passed Senate Floor 24-14 on 05/26/05; Passed Assembly Floor 47-31 on 09/29/05. VETOED.
33. **Public Works Prevailing Wages** (AB 364 - Cogdill). Would have exempted those public works financed through the use of industrial development bonds under the California Industrial Development Financing Act from compliance with laws relating to payment of prevailing wages in projects financed by the California Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank. FAILED in Assembly Labor Committee 2-6 on 04/20/2005. BAD BILL.
34. **Prevailing Wage Rate Determination** (AB 474 - Cogdill). Would have required the Director of Industrial Relations, in making the determination of the general prevailing rate of per diem wages, to factor in studies on wages paid in rural areas. FAILED in Assembly Labor Committee on 2-6 on 04/20/05. BAD BILL.
35. **Alternative Workweek 10** (AB 640 - Tran). Would have weakened daily overtime protections for workers by relaxing the standards for implementation of alternative workweek schedules. Would have required employees to work ten hours before qualifying for overtime pay, instead of eight hours as required by current law. Failed in Assembly Labor Committee 2-6 on 04/20/05. BAD BILL.
36. **Alternative Workweek 12** (AB 904 - Houston). Would have weakened daily overtime protections for workers by relaxing the standards for implementation of alternative workweek schedules. Would have required employees to work twelve hours in a day before qualifying for overtime pay, instead of eight hours as required by current law. FAILED in Assembly Labor Committee 2-5 on 04/20/05. BAD BILL.
37. **Community College Classified Employee Contracting** (AB 1468 - McCarthy). Would have repealed various accountability measures in current law (SB 1419 Alarcón, 2002), which govern school districts and community colleges when they opt to contract out services performed by classified service employees. FAILED 3-8 on 04/20/05 in Assembly Education Committee. BAD BILL.
38. **Workplace Postings** (AB 1709 - Wyland). Would have over-simplified the language on workplace postings and, in so doing, failed to convey the full meaning of the law to the detriment of workers. FAILED 2-5 on 04/20/05 in Assembly Labor Committee. BAD BILL.
39. **Voluntary Drug Discounts** (SB 19 - Ortiz/Poohigian). Would have created an ineffective voluntary drug discount program for pharmaceutical companies, which would have failed to control consumer costs. FAILED 5-5 on 04/27/05 in Senate Health Committee. BAD BILL.
40. **Defined Benefit Plans** (SB 916 - Speier). Would have required the suspension or reduction of workers' compensation benefits - including temporary disability, permanent disability, and lifetime pension benefits - that a retired injured worker may receive if he or she is also receiving a retirement allowance. FAILED in Senate Labor Committee 3-5 on 04/27/05. BAD BILL.
41. **Division of Workers Compensation Confirmation.** Confirmation to Administrative Director of the Division of Workers' Compensation of Andrea Hoch, who finalized illegal rules that slashed permanent disability worker benefits. Passed Senate Floor 21- 10 on 04/28/05. BAD CONFIRMATION.
